Student Mobility Trends

Open Doors Report – ECA Funded Annual Publication on International Student Mobility

- Overview of 2016 Data:
 - 7.1% growth in international students (1,043.839)
 - Top Senders: China, India, Saudi Arabia, South Korea, Canada
 - Notable Growth: India (24.9%), Nepal (18.4%), Vietnam (14.3%), Nigeria (12.4%)
 - 2.9% increase in U.S. students abroad (313,415)
 - Top Destinations: UK, Italy, Spain
 - Notable Growth: Greece (18.3%), Austria (17%), Ireland (15.9%), Israel (15.3%), Czech Republic (14.6%)
 - ~70% of all international students study at only 200 U.S. HEIs
